The Governor lifted the EO N-29-20 on September 30, 2021, which waived certain requirements of the Ralph M. Brown Act (Brown Act) in order to prevent gatherings and slow the spread of COVID-19, and required local public agencies that conduct public meetings virtually to allow members of the public to observe and address the meeting telephonically or otherwise electronically. 1. Bear sightings! Bears are not uncommon in this area, and there have been reports of bears in the District in years past. However, recently, several residents have called with news that a bear (or bears?) has been seen, heard and trash cans have been tipped over and trash strewn about. I called Fish and Wildlife Service and they recommended that we do not approach or corner bears, bear proof our properties, such as; keeping garbage cans clean and inaccessible to bears, keep pet food put away, don't hang bird feeders, and clean BBQ grills. They also suggest we "harass or haze" any bears we see getting too close, such as; making loud noises or using air horns to scare them away and/or set up motion detection sprinklers. El Dorado County Leash Law

This notice will keep repeating as many new families are moving into the District! The District Office has been receiving many complaints from residents about loose dogs and dogs off leash harassing their livestock and chasing them while walking, biking and riding horses in the District. We would like to remind all residents that according to El Dorado County Ordinance Code Title 6, Chapter 6.12 Section 6.12.070 -Running at large prohibited: (in part, look it up if you wish to see the full version): "No person owning or having control of any animal...shall permit such animal...to stray or run at large upon any...unenclosed private lot or other unenclosed private place in the County..." part A states: "Any animal other than working animals shall be confined by the owner or his or her agent on a leash of not more than ten feet in length during any time the animal is removed from an enclosed private lot or enclosed private place." FYI if your loose dog causes bodily harm to human or animal, or even "engages in behavior that requires a person to take defensive action to prevent physical injury...or otherwise causes injury to any domestic animal" you are guilty of a misdemeanor and could be fined and sued. Upon conviction your dog could be deemed dangerous and/or vicious and if any other violation occurs after that designation, fees will be imposed upon you; you will be held liable for damages and your dog impounded and/or euthanized. Please keep your dogs confined at home and on leash while walking them.
